<p>Independent school model</p> <p>ECHS students may also participate in the TJC Promise Scholarship Program</p>	<p>Program offered in districts</p> <p>Dual credit students may also participate in the TJC Promise Scholarship Program</p>	<p>Scholarship program offered to 9th Graders (Starting with the class of 2020)</p>
<p>Blended high school and college curriculum beginning in the 9th grade</p>	<p>College courses offered in 11th and 12th grade</p>	<p>Students sign a promise to maintain a specific grade point average, attendance, discipline, and community service</p>
<p>60 college credits and/or Associates degree for all students and a planned program of study</p>	<p>24/32 college credits maximum</p> <p>Some credits may be earned through Advanced Placement exams</p>	<p>TJC Promise Scholarship goes into effect upon high school graduation.</p> <p>Once the promise is broken, you may not renew the promise.</p>
<p>Academic, social, and emotion support</p> <p>Smaller classes</p>	<p>Limited or not focused on academic services</p>	<p>Students must renew their promise each year until they graduate from high school</p>
<p>Must be at no cost to students (tuition, fees, textbooks, entrance-exams)</p>	<p>Students are charged tuition and may or may not be charged textbooks.</p> <p>Students are responsible for paying testing fees for TSI and AP exams</p>	<p>If the student has kept their promise they are eligible for free-tuition to TJC; after all grants and other scholarships have been paid</p>
<p>Target various backgrounds to apply</p>	<p>Serves college-bound students</p>	<p>Students that have kept their promise upon high school graduation are eligible.</p>
